BUSINESS ITEMS	A. 2023 Commission Work Plan: Develop & Approve 2023 Work Plan Motion/Second: Berryhill/Lien Motion carried by vote of AYES: All
LIAISON REPORT	A. Milpitas Unified School District (MUSD) Report (School Board Member Lien): - Students are back in school. - Ribbon-cutting ceremony at Mable Mattos School, and the two tracks at Russell and Rancho Middle Schools. - Innovation Campus (Ayer H.S.) is under construction, funding available through the passing of Measure AA (bond). Friday, 9/16, there will be a tour of the Ayer Alumni at the Innovation Campus. On Saturday, 9/17, at Murphy Park, MUSD will launch the Brick Donation program for fundraising for the Innovation Campus. Donations for bricks range from \$175 – \$1,000. B. Council Report (Council Member Dominguez): 2022-23 Fiscal Year Budget has passed.

2. Councilmember Dominguez shares concern over the increase in gang violence in the community.
 3. Councilmember Dominguez is concerned and tracking the MPD high call volume to the Project Homekey location. Councilmember to reach out to Captain Miller regarding new site management to hopefully reduce the amount of call volume to MPD regarding civil matters.
- C. Emergency Services Report (OEM Coordinator Charlop):
1. CERT: OEM Charlop looking to bring the in-person CERT class back to Milpitas in early 2023, pending to coordinate with Milpitas Recreation for use of facilities.
 2. RACES: Commissioner Ellis has updated the members roster, leaving approximately 11 active members. OEM is in the process of updating RACES computer hardware and software. The Countywide RACES drill is this weekend.
- D. Fire Report (Chief Suzuki):
1. MFD FF's have been deployed to the Mosquito Fire.
 2. Fire Station 2 (Yosemite) is due to open Oct. 3, with ribbon cutting tentatively scheduled for Oct. 20th.
 3. MFD is waiting on taking delivery of two wildland vehicles.
 4. MFD has taken a delivery of Lucas Devices, which provide hands free CPR to medical aid victims.
 5. Currently there is a paramedic shortage, which is causing FF's to have to join EMS companies to provide advanced life-saving efforts during transport. Milpitas ambulance company is now active and has designated triggers when it will be deployed.
 6. Milpitas has hired 10 new FFs. There is a new Fire Marshal and Assistant Fire Marshal. Deputy Chief Stelling is retiring at the end of 2022, BC Schoonover is being promoted to DC Stelling's vacated position. BC Suzuki and BC Powers have recently promoted, opening promotional opportunities of new Captains and Engineers.
 7. Milpitas FD will be participating in an Active Shooter Drill at Sunnyvale.
- E. Police (Captain Morales):
1. MPD has hired two new dispatchers.
 2. MPD has 6 officer vacancies. 1 applicant is nearing completion of the testing process. 2 new recruits are in the Alameda County Sheriff's Office Academy.
 3. MPD is evaluating candidates to fill a vacant Police Evidence Technician position.
 4. Upcoming Pub Ed events: Coffee with a Cop, Howl-O-ween, etc.
 5. There has been some gang activity, MPD is aware of who's involved and actively investigating. School Resource Officers at MHS (work with other schools as well) collaborate with MUSD staff and Recreation and Community Services staff to provide resources to at risk youth. MPD utilizes a Juvenile Referral Program to guide families and youth to resources meant to prevent youth from offending or engaging in risky behavior.
